Oct 5th INTERGENERATIONAL GATHERING: "<u>Water Communion</u>" - Join us for one of our most beloved Unitarian Universalist traditions! This month (theme: Equity) we'll explore how access to something as simple and vital as clean water differs around the world. Please bring a small container of water (12 oz or less) from a special place in your life—whether it is a favorite lake, the ocean, or even your kitchen tap. Together we'll pour our waters and our stories into one community.

7TH PRINCIPLE OF UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM

"Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are part."

WAYS WE ACT ON OUR PRINCIPLES

The <u>Unitarian Universalist Ministry for Earth</u> envisions a world in which reverence, gratitude, and care for the living Earth are central to the lives of all people. Their purpose is to inspire, facilitate, and support personal, congregational, and denominational practices that honor and sustain the Earth and all beings. They affirm and promote the seven principles of the Unitarian Universalist Association, including: "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part."

Key Aspects of the 7th Principle

- <u>Interconnectedness</u>: It emphasizes the fundamental idea that everything in the universe is connected and interdependent.
- **Environmental Stewardship:** The principle serves as a foundation for environmental ethics, encouraging the protection of the Earth and all its inhabitants.
- **Beyond Environmentalism:** It goes beyond a purely ecological concept to include the spiritual and philosophical understanding of the oneness of existence and the creative force that sustains life.
- Moral Guide: For UU ministers and congregations, it is a commitment to living in a way that honors this interdependence, protecting life, and recognizing our place within the larger system.
- A Response to Oppression: It is also framed as a counter to individualism, offering a vision of community and interdependence that can help resolve conflicts and move away from systems of exploitation.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT/SOCIAL JUSTICE



Since 1993, The Sharing Place has been fulfilling its mission to "provide a safe and caring environment for grieving children, teens, and their families to share their feelings while healing themselves." This is achieved through a support group model that emphasizes acknowledging any and all feelings related to grief, connection with others experiencing grief, and channeling feelings through art, play, and discussion.

The Sharing Place was founded when a determined young mother, Chris Chytraus, sought help for her two children after their father died. She soon discovered there was a lack of resources in the Salt Lake City area for grieving children. With the help of her children's therapist, Nancy Reiser, The Sharing Place grief support groups were created. The Sharing Place has provided a safe haven to grieving families since 1993, providing hope not only to Chris and her children but to thousands of others their journey has touched. 

KIDS CORNER

At UUFSU, we joyfully embrace children and families as an essential part of our beloved community. Our children's and youth programming is designed to be engaging, inclusive, and fun—a place where young minds can explore, grow, and connect while learning the values that define Unitarian Universalism, including the UUA's Shared Values and Seven Principles.

Intergenerational gatherings are held the 1st Sunday of each month and incorporate stories, music, videos, and activities that are interesting and engaging for ALL ages. On the 3rd Sunday of every month, we offer separate programming for children (ages 3 to 9) and youth (ages 10+) concurrent with the adult programming.


In October, our Children/Youth programs will focus on the shared value of Equity.



• Oct 5th: Join us for our all-ages Water Communion as we explore the theme of equity through the lens of clean water access around the world and celebrate the waters that sustain and connect us! Please bring a small container (12 oz or less) of water from a place that matters to you—whether it's from a faraway ocean or right from your kitchen sink.



• Oct 19th: Kids aged 3-9 get to explore equity with a story by beloved children's author Mo Willems and some LEGO inspiration on designing places for all people! Come ready to build, play, and dream up a more inclusive world. Youth 10+ will light their chalice, learn the popular UU song, "Spirit of Life" and discuss Equity and Equality.



We also offer **child care on the 2nd and 4th Sundays** of every month. On these days, parents are welcome to drop off their child(ren) in the kids' room starting at 12:45 pm, where they can engage in supervised free play for the length of the service. If using the child care room, we recommend that parents arrive early to get their children settled before the start of the service. Youth (10+) are encouraged to attend the adult programs on these days.
