UUFSU Programs



Sep 7th INTERGENERATIONAL GATHERING: "Good News, Bad News." This service for **ALL AGES** will examine the UU shared value of "pluralism," and in particular the importance of considering the limits of our own perspective while recognizing the value of others'. Together we'll watch a short video, read an interactive story, and play a visual perception game. Adults and youth will then listen to and discuss an excerpt from David Foster Wallace's "This is Water" while younger children complete an art project.

Sep 14th **SERVICE:** "The Bubble." This service will center on a video presentation of a sermon by Rev. J of First Church "The Bubble." The title refers to the insulating bubbles that we all live in which isolate us from people who are different and/or undesirable to us. Rev. J will tell of some of the bubbles she has lived in and how they affected her. There will be a chalice lighting, music, readings, and a discussion to follow. *Child care is offered during this service (see Page 6 for details).*

Sep 21st FORUM: "Founders of Dixie Cooperative." Sharon Shores and Keith Kelch will present their innovative solution to our community's affordable housing crisis. Dixie Cooperative is a member managed organization of businesses and community volunteers with a commitment to provide affordable housing in St. George and surrounding communities. It's an exciting and completely unique, groundbreaking project that merits your attention. We will also host separate/concurrent programs for children (ages 3-9). Kids (10+) will meet in their separate class on developing spirituality,

Sep 28th **SERVICE**: "<u>Philosophical Ethics.</u>" Hosted by Emma Prendergast (Assistant Professor of Philosophy and the Humanities Center Director at Utah Tech University). Together, we'll explore a range of ethical perspectives, from the ethics of justice to the ethics of care and reflect on how they shape our choices in a complex world. There will be a chalice lighting, music, readings, and a discussion to follow. *Child care is offered during this service (see Page 6 for details).*

1st PRINCIPLE OF UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM

"The inherent worth and dignity of every person."

WAYS WE ACT ON OUR PRINCIPLES

The first of the <u>Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA)</u> Seven Principles is the affirmation and promotion of "the inherent worth and dignity of every person." This principle emphasizes the belief that every individual possesses intrinsic value and deserves respect, regardless of their background, beliefs, or circumstances.



Here's a breakdown of the concept:

- <u>Inherent Worth</u>: This refers to the idea that each person's value is not earned or granted but is inherent to their being.
- <u>Dignity</u>: This means that each person deserves to be treated with respect and honor.
- <u>Every Person</u>: This highlights the principle's inclusivity, extending this worth and dignity to all individuals.

The UUA's first principle is rooted in the belief that there is potential for good in all dimensions of being, and it encourages celebrating human gifts and cherishing both body and soul. It also emphasizes self-respect and respect for others.

KIDS CORNER



At UUFSU, we joyfully embrace children and families as an essential part of our beloved community. Our children's programming is designed to be engaging, inclusive, and fun—a place where young minds can explore, grow, and connect while learning the values that define Unitarian Universalism, including the **UUA's Shared Values and Seven Principles.**

Intergenerational gatherings are held the 1st Sunday of each month and incorporate stories, music, videos, and activities that are interesting and engaging for ALL ages. On the 3rd Sunday of every month, we offer separate programming for children (ages 3 to 9) and youth (ages 10+) concurrent with the adult programming. In September, our Religious Education (RE) program will focus on the shared value of *Pluralism*.

We also offer child care on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of every month. On these days, parents are welcome to drop off their child(ren) in the kids' room starting at 12:45 pm, where they can engage in supervised free play for the length of the service. If using the child care room, we recommend that parents arrive early to get their children settled before the start of the service. Youth (10+) are encouraged to attend the adult programs on the 2nd and 4th Sundays.

We're excited to welcome everyone back from summer break and look forward to a great year of expanded programming for children and youth!
